Goff manages the International Business Cohort Program admission process, serves as the Academic Coordinator for the International Business of the Americas program, International Business and Education Alliance and the International Business of the Middle East and North Africa Program. In addition, she continues to advise students as a member of the specialized advisement team for International Business majors.

More times than not, these students are completely different human beings with an increased cultural tolerance, appreciation for different perspectives and the ability to adapt and adjust in a moment's notice. They've learned to slow down, to take it all in, and to appreciate where they are in that exact moment—it's a breath of fresh air to see."

Dolan echoed that statement, "[She] has been exceptionally hands-on in navigating alongside a triple major with three semesters abroad, and I cannot thank her enough for all that she has done thus far."

In 2016, **Goff won the University's Ada B. Thomas Award** which recognizes quality advising to undergraduate students. The advice she would give to other advisors is to,

"Do the job you were hired to do. Be available to your students, be willing to do a little extra or go a little further, and don't pretend to know the answers. By doing everything for students, we are only doing them a disservice—they never learn to problem-solve, think strategically or how to advocate for themselves. Stopping and really listening helps guide and teach them how to navigate a multitude of situations and scenarios. By helping them actively think through a situation, we are helping them either gain confidence in their ability to do so, or helping them fine tune a character trait already present."

In an unprecedented year, filled with many obstacles and challenges, Goff states,

"My students are incredible, and being able to work with such world-changers is a tremendous blessing to me. I am forever grateful for the opportunity I have to work with them in the capacity I do."

And although advising may look a bit different this semester, Dolan said, "I am sad that I have not had the chance to see her around DMSB this semester, but have not felt forgotten in any way, otherwise!"

"The University can be a difficult place to navigate," Goff continued,

"Going a little further to help students along their way can make all the difference in the world to a student and their experience here at Carolina. Commit to turning the 'I don't know's' into a learning opportunity for yourself. Personally invest your time into becoming a more knowledgeable employee, and advisor, by being informed and aware. Lastly, I suggest trying to have a little fun along the way—smile, laugh and try to find growth in some capacity in each opportunity and experience."



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
